### Activities

#### Discussion

Ask students to discuss the following questions in class or in small groups:

- What would you do if someone you knew and cared about abused or became addicted to pain meds?
- Do you know someone who is in denial about their pain med abuse?
   How do you feel about it?
- If someone told you it was safe to use their leftover pain meds because they didn't use them all after a surgery, how would you respond?

## Create a Flyer or Brochure

Ask small groups of students to create a flyer or brochure about the dangers of using or abusing pain medication. The flyer or brochure should have images and information about the short- and long-term effects of taking pain medication including appropriate, recommended amounts for injuries and surgeries. Ask students to include healthier coping mechanisms for dealing with physical and emotional pain. Have them explain their brochure to the class.

## Journal Writing

Give students this journal entry prompt, "My personal experience with pain medication is..." Encourage students to write about an experience with pain meds that involved self, a family member, friend, classmate, or character in a tv show/movie. Encourage students to express their thoughts/feelings regarding why the person may have used or abused the meds or drugs and why they will personally "say no" in the future. Ask students to think about their personal goals as they ponder reasons to say "no."
